Bel-Airtifacts, Part 1

Memories from Bel-Air Residents

We are so fortunate to have neighbors who have lived in Bel-Air for many years and are willing to share stories they remember or have collected about the area. One of our current Bel-Air residents recently shared the following:

I surely wish some of the original residents of Bel-Air would have let me record their stories of living in Bel-Air. Unfortunately, they have passed away, so I have only scant stories I have heard over the years!

From what stories I have heard and been told, the Bel-Air area (San Mateo to Carlisle and Candelaria to Menaul) was part of an old ranch at one time...Maybe the Montgomery Family Ranch that the street was named after...Until recently, there was a windmill still standing on the north side of Montgomery just west of Carlisle.

Bel-Air began outside the city limits and began on San Mateo and gradually was built west to Carlisle. There were no city facilities way back then so each of the lots had septic tanks (yes, our lot still has the original one somewhere in our back yard!)

Stay tuned history buffs...Next time you will learn what our neighbor has to say about cows, arroyos, and interstates on the next Bel-Airtifacts!

Did you know?

According to the Albuquerque Historical Society, the Candelaria family settled in Albuquerque in 1706. The major arterial, Candelaria Road, is named for them. Montgomery Boulevard was named for Eugene Montgomery. His family homesteaded on land near what is now Carlisle and Montgomery around 1909. Menaul Boulevard was named for Irish-born James A. Menaul, who came to Albuquerque in 1881. He organized First Presbyterian Church.

The Bel-Air subdivision was annexed into the city in 1951

Keep Bel-Air Beautiful

By keeping Bel-Air Clean!

It is a simple and free activity that can have instant results for your child and your community.

Possible recipients

Anyone who enjoys a pristine neighborhood, park, beach, or public walkway.

What you'll need

- Plastic bag to collect trash
- Work Gloves
- Optional: pick-up stick, separate bag for recyclables

Instructions

Assign gloves and a trash bag to each family member.

Clear out litter from a section of park, beach, vacant lot or your own neighborhood. Take all necessary precautions, including wearing sturdy gloves, being careful near roads, having adults handle dangerous items and supervising children closely. You can pick your favorite walk and do a one-time sweep or make clean-up a regular family event.

Properly dispose of all litter.

Reflections

Did you find a lot of litter? What kind of litter did you see most often? What could be done to help with that problem?

Why is it important to pick up litter?

What would our neighborhood look like if everyone littered? How would you feel about living here? What other ways can we take care of the spaces where we live?

Sharps 101

At our last neighborhood clean-up, neighbors pick up approximated 50 sharps at the Miramontes/Bel-Air park. What are sharps?

"Sharps" is a medical term for devices with sharp points or edges that can puncture or cut skin. Examples of sharps include:

- **Needle** – a very fine, slender, hollow piece of metal used to inject medication under the skin.
- **Syringe** – a device which a needle is attached to in order to inject medication into or withdraw fluid from the body.
- **Lancet** – also called a "finger-stick," an instrument with a short, two-edged blade used to get drops of blood for testing. Lancets are commonly used in the treatment of diabetes.

Importance of Safe Sharps Disposal

Used needles and other sharps are dangerous to people and pets if not disposed of safely because they can injure people and spread infections that cause serious health conditions. The most common infections are:

- Hepatitis B (HBV),
- Hepatitis C (HCV), and
- Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV).

We hear from neighbors that they have found used sharps in the park, alleyways, and even thrown in backyards. It is critical we, as a community, learn how to safely dispose of this hazardous material if we should come across it.

Safe Sharp Clean-up Training

BANA has teamed up with the City's Environmental Health Department and surrounding neighborhood associations to bring you a **FREE** training on safe sharps clean-up. Coffee and donuts will be served. After, we will clean up sharps around the park and neighborhood.
